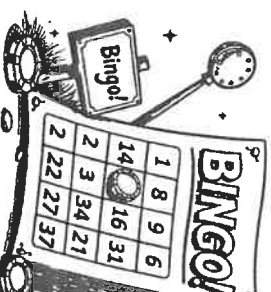
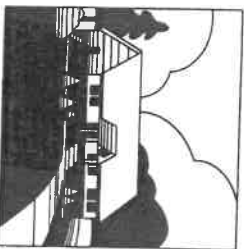

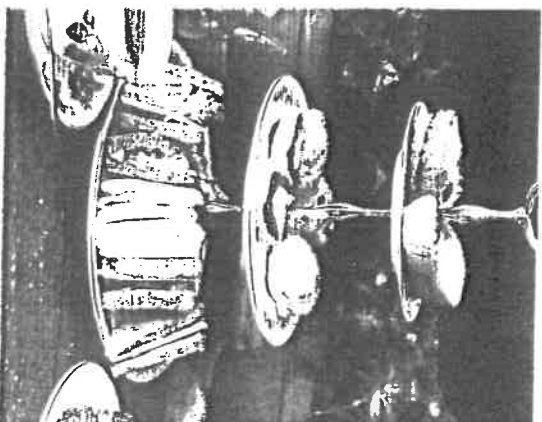
Rock Bass Derby

It's a Part of Our History

Way back even before 1937, a hunting camp stood on the north shore of Bottle Lake. The camp was owned by J.E.A. Fitzgerald. Fred Ray still remembers how J.E.A. Fitzgerald would have Jim Turner Sr., (Fred's Brother-in-law) row a boat around and around Bottle Lake, while Fitzgerald would sit and troll for lake trout. Fitzgerald's camp would later exchange hands and was sold to Ray Best. He kept the camp for a few years and in turn then sold the place once again.

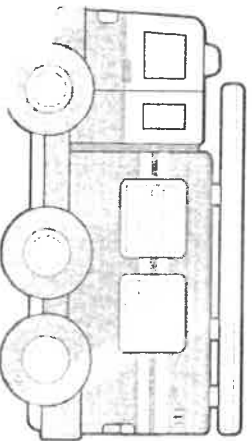
The new owners were people by the name of McConkeys. They hunted for the first time out of this camp in the fall of 1937. They called their place the "Bottle Lake Hunt Camp". The camp consisted of two separate buildings. The one was 20 feet by 30 feet. It was just long enough to seat 10 men around a long table. Down the hill a bit, closer to the lake, was the bigger bunkhouse which could sleep ten men.

In 1964, the Bottle Lake Hunt Club's camp use permit was cancelled due to fact that this whole area was in the planning to become a Park. So the camp members bought a Brent gun carrier (WWII light armored vehicle) for \$ 50.00 with which they pulled a big wagon loaded with their disassembled camp and began their four mile trek. The camp relocated to the east branch of Stoney Creek and is still used as a camp today.

Also in the same hunting area was another gang known as The Harwood Camp. Some of the men which hunted out of here were: Russ Johnson and his two sons Ivan & Ken, Lyle Davie and his two sons Gene & Kevin, Don Ferguson, Dennis Corkary and Kurt Mahanney (a Newfoundlander and a Great Musician – especially with the Banjo) This collection of guys hunted and lived out of a tent during the hunting seasons. Their tent was pitched right at the Old Mill Pond Dam, where they would later built a cabin around 1950. Their cabin was in use until around 1970. There are still a few boards from the camp still lying around there, along with parts of their old stove and a collection of old cans and beer bottles. Their camp permit, which like others was issued yearly was revoked and their camp was finally torn down (due to the soon to be park).

Gordon Ray Sr. along with his two sons Fred and Gordon Jr. and Al Proctor a long time friend, hunted the area surrounding Bottle Lake from 1945 thru 1949. The four hunters slept in tents, along with their deer hounds. I'm sure that on a cold night, a warm hound was a welcomed commodity in your sleeping bag. They finally built a permanent camp located on the south shore of Bottle Lake (the white cottage) in 1949. This building was used as their hunting camp/cottage for the next seventeen years.

Fred and his Dad would later build the Nixon Lake Hunt Camp located on the north shore of Nixon's Lake. This camp was built in 1966. The camp is still used for the fall hunting season.



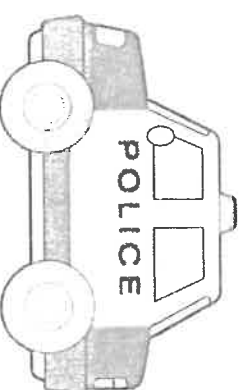

Municipal Voting in 2026

Most of the time, the political decisions that have the greatest influence on our lives are the ones that affect the area closest to where we live. Thus, voting in the municipal elections coming up this fall in Trent Lakes may be our most important political action in 2026.

First Things First

Usually I just try to present our candidates while encouraging you to vote – if you care about what happens in our community. But this year, there is another step or 2: even if you have been on the Voters' List in Trent Lakes since before there was a Trent Lakes, your name may have fallen off the list this year. Even if you own only one property in Ontario and you always vote and you authorize the government to share your address with the Voters' List, your name may now be missing.

As I understand it, in the past, the municipal Voters' List was maintained by MPAC. This year that responsibility has been taken over by Elections Ontario. I don't know why it has all gone wrong but, according to one member of Council, the number of voters in Trent Lakes has dropped from about 11,000 in 2022 to 7,500 now. Huh?

So, your first task is to discover whether you are on the list. If you rent or own property in Trent Lakes, you get to vote in our municipal elections. If you own or rent property in both wards in Trent Lakes, you get to vote in both of them. But only if you are on the list. (Truth to tell, you can, in a pinch, get yourself added on voting day if you show up at the appropriate polling station and if you have the appropriate identification with you – personally, I wouldn't leave anything this important to a solution that iffy.) And while you're at it, make sure you are on the local list if you have property or a business in any other municipality in Ontario.

How to Get on the Voters' List

Until August 12, see your latest tax bill or check at either Library in Trent Lakes for information about getting on the list. I phoned and was advised that the easiest way to ensure I am on the list is to wait until August 12 and then go to the Municipal Office and ask to see the list. You will need your Driver's License or provincial identification card for your primary residence. For any additional locations, you will need a tax bill or something else to show that you qualify.

Now, Who do I Want to Vote for?

Note: Usually I wait to do this until the nomination period has closed (August 21). However, this year I can't wait that long – I'm 4 years older and seem to need more time to do everything. If you are a candidate who signs up after my arbitrary deadline, I apologize.

I emailed everyone on the unofficial list of candidates for positions on council or the school board in Trent Lakes by July 21 and asked them to write up to 100 words on “**how you think you can help our area during the next 4 years.**” Any candidate who signed up after that date did not have this opportunity. Until August 21, you can find out about all candidates by going to the Municipality of Trent Lakes and searching for the Unofficial List of Candidates. After that, look for the Official List of Candidates.

The responses I received are all printed below. Sadly, 2 candidates did not make submissions despite 2 emails.

I'm sure we are all grateful for those who were willing to talk to us through this newsletter, as well as for all candidates for offering to serve the community we all value and want to protect.

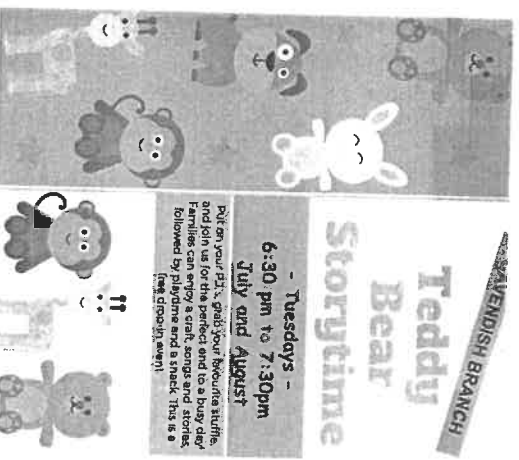
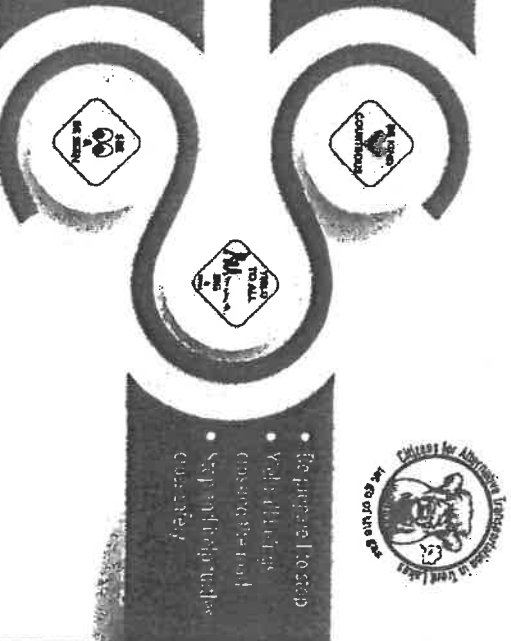

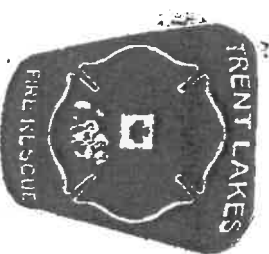
CODE OF THE ROAD

Apply for a Burn Permit

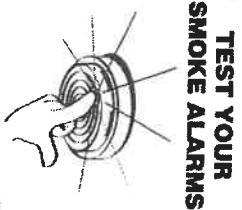
Are you planning on having an open air burn in Trent Lakes? If so, you must have a burn permit. Permits are free and they are valid until December 31st of the year you obtained it.

Key Messages:

- ✓ Ontario law requires that working smoke alarms be located on every storey of the home and outside all sleeping areas. Failure to comply with the Fire Code smoke alarm requirements could result in a ticket for \$235 or a fine of up to \$50,000 for individuals or \$100,000 for corporations.
- ✓ For added protection, install a smoke alarm in every bedroom.
- ✓ Test smoke alarms monthly.
- ✓ Change the battery in each smoke alarm once a year or whenever the low-battery warning sounds.
- ✓ Vacuum the exterior of the smoke alarm using the soft bristle attachment on the vacuum cleaner.
- ✓ Replace smoke alarms that are more than ten years old.
- ✓ Always follow the manufacturer's instructions for installing, testing and maintaining smoke alarms.

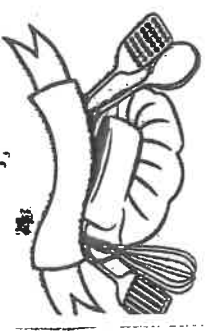
Recipe of the Month

"WHITE" CHOCOLATE CAKE

Prep. Time: 20 minutes Cook Time: 45 minutes

- 1/4 lb. white chocolate (melted)
- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 5 eggs
- 2 3/4 cups cake flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup flaked coconut, optional
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Cream together butter and sugar. Add melted chocolate and eggs, beating well after each addition. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with buttermilk. Stir in vanilla, coconut and nuts. Pour into greased and floured 10x15 or three 8-inch round cake pans. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Frost with "White Fudge Icing."



"WHITE" FUDGE ICING

Prep. Time: 15 - 20 minutes

- 1 cup white chocolate, melted
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup butter
- 1 1/4 cups sugar
- 2 teaspoons vanilla

In a medium saucepan over low heat, combine melted white chocolate and flour. Stir this into a paste and then add milk, stirring constantly. Cook until mixture is very thick. Remove from heat and let cool completely. In a large mixing bowl, cream together butter, sugar and vanilla. Beat this mixture with an electric mixer set on high for 3 full minutes. Gradually add cooled chocolate mixture and continue beating at high speed until icing is the consistency of whipped cream. If you're frosting three cake layers, spread icing only on top of

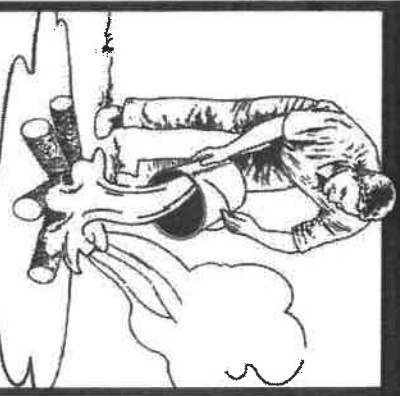

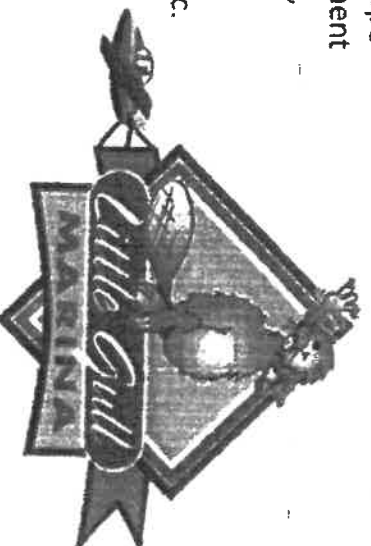

Key Messages:

- ✓ Check with your local municipal office or Ministry of Natural Resources for burning restrictions or bylaws before burning grass or brush around your cottage.
- ✓ Build campfires on bare soil or exposed rock, well sheltered from the wind. Keep a pail of water and a shovel on hand to control the fire.
- ✓ Douse campfires with water and stir the ashes with a stick or shovel to allow the water to soak in and cool the ashes and the ground.
- ✓ Campfires should never be left unattended and must be thoroughly extinguished before leaving the site.
- ✓ Extinguish cigarette butts by dousing them with water or crushing them thoroughly in bare mineral soil or on bare rock.
- ✓ Never discard a burning cigarette in the bush or from the window of a moving vehicle.
- ✓ Allow portable generators, stoves and lanterns to cool before refuelling. Refuel on bare soil or exposed rock.

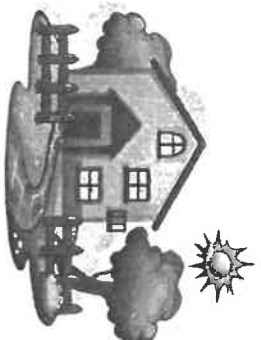


Gardening Tips

- Keep up with deadheading. Roses, daylilies, dahlias, and cosmos will all keep on flowering for longer if regularly deadheaded, and they make beautiful cut flowers.
- Now is the time to prune rambling roses. Remove one in every three old stems and tie any loose growth into supports. Shorten side shoots by approximately two-thirds.
- Prune wisteria, cutting back all of this year's long wispy shoots to 5 – 6 leaves from the main framework.
- Water container plants regularly.
- Feed flowering plants biweekly with a high potash liquid feed like tomato fertilizer.
- Collect seeds from nigella and poppies for sowing next spring.
- Keep your bird baths top up during the hot weather.
- Prune raspberries once they are finished producing, cut all of this year's fruited canes to ground level.
- Mow the lawn less often if the weather is dry and raise the blade height on your lawnmower.

We would like to take this opportunity to apologize for the article published in the July 2026 507 Express. Our thanks to Robin Johnson who brought them to our attention.

The article was taken from "Logging of Stoney Creek, Hunt Camps – The Past & Present – Cottage Life. In the article they talk about the Marinas on Catchacoma Lake. They mention a landing owned by Piersons which was in fact Frank Pearson and the marina was known as Pearson's Landing till the day it closed. Frank Pearson sold the Marina to a gentleman by the name of Reginald Burns who kept it for a short time then sold it in 1960 to Lillian and Roy Asling.

In 1970 the Asling's sold the marina to Audrey and Bill Judge who in turn sold it five years later to Eric and Martin Kjaer. In 1976 the Kjaer brothers sold the business to Marilyn and Gary Weitzel, and it was closed as a marina around 1986. That now leaves one Marina on Catchacoma Lake which is Catchacoma Marina formally known as Baldwin Bay Marina and in the earliest days as Manley's Landing.

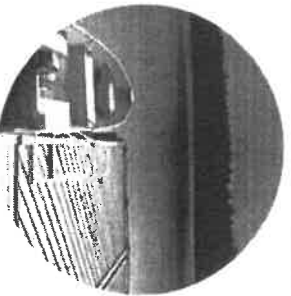

BOATERS

Letting invasive species aboard your boat helps them spread in our lakes, rivers and streams and costs us millions to repair their damage. Learn what you can do to help stop the spread.

Follow the clean, drain, dry method

Clean your boat and gear

Before transporting your boat overland, clean any mud, vegetation, algae, mussels or any other animals from your boat, motor, trailer, vehicle or equipment. Zebra and quagga mussels are happy to hang onto your hull, while aquatic plants like Eurasian water-milfoil hide on your motor, anchor and trailer.

Drain all water by opening or removing your drain plugs

Drain all water by pulling the plug on your transom, bilge, livewell (unless you are lawfully transporting live fish), or any other water containing devices at the boat launch and before transporting your boat overland. Never take an aquatic invasive species from one body of water to another.

Dry or disinfect

Some aquatic invasive species can survive up to two weeks out of water and not every invader attached to your boat can be seen with the naked eye. To remove invaders you can't see before travelling to a new body of water, it is recommended you either:

- dry your boat in sunlight
- clean your boat from top to bottom with hot water or pressurized water

Avoid aquatic plants

Avoid driving your boat through aquatic plants. Propellers can break them loose and spread invasive species.

Know the rules

As of January 1st, 2022, Ontario has regulated watercraft (boats, canoes, kayaks) as a carrier of invasive species under the Invasive Species Act.

Boaters are now required to take the following steps before transporting a boat or boat equipment overland:

- remove or open drain plugs to allow water to drain from the boat or boat equipment
- take reasonable precautions to remove all aquatic plants (weeds), animals and algae from any boat, boat equipment, vehicle or trailer

Before reaching a launch site or placing a watercraft in any body of water in Ontario, boaters are required to ensure their boat, boating equipment, vehicles or trailers are free of all:

- aquatic plants
- animals
- algae

It is illegal to place a boat, boating equipment or any vehicle or trailer into any body of water if there are any aquatic plants, animals or algae attached to it.

These rules recognize that it may not be possible to fully remove all aquatic plants, animals or algae (for example, hidden zebra mussels or small plant fragments in hard to reach locations) when removing the watercraft from the water at the launch site. Boaters can do a more thorough cleaning of their boat, utilizing special equipment, such as pressure washers at a more suitable location, to ensure their boat is completely free of aquatic plants, animals and algae.

Note: the requirement to remove drain plugs does not apply to:

- drinking water systems, marine sanitary systems or closed engine cooling systems
- a livewell, if the person transporting the livewell overland is transporting live fish in the livewell pursuant to a licence to transport live fish issued under the *Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act, 1997*

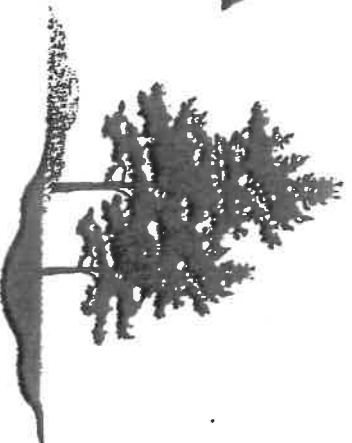

Thunderstorm

Thunderstorms can bring lightning, heavy rain, hail, strong winds and tornadoes.

Hazard information

Lightning kills about nine Canadians each year and seriously injures more than 100 people.

Safety tips

- be aware of weather conditions and warnings
- seek shelter immediately if a warning has been issued or you believe one could occur

If you are indoors:

- Stay away from windows, skylights and glass doors — strong winds and large hailstones can shatter them.
- Avoid running water in your house — lightning can enter through pipes and plumbing.
- Don't take showers or baths during a thunderstorm.
- Remain indoors during a thunderstorm and stay inside for at least 30 minutes after the last rumble of thunder.
- Be prepared to seek shelter in a basement or interior room on the lowest level if conditions worsen.

- If you hear thunder, then lightning is close enough to be dangerous — take shelter in an enclosed building or metal-topped vehicle.
- Avoid water, high ground, isolated trees, power lines and picnic shelters — small, open structures don't protect you from lightning.
- If there's no shelter, go to a low-lying area away from tall, isolated objects — crouch down and put your feet together — do not lie down.

If power outage results:

- Important safety tips during power outages (<https://www.ontario.ca/page/power-outages-and-blackouts>)

Prepare now

Take the following steps so you and your family are prepared in the event of an emergency:

- Have a safe room in your home where everyone gathers during a storm — away from windows, skylights and glass doors.
- If there's a tornado, gather in a basement, storm cellar or interior room on the lowest floor.
- Remove dead or rotting trees and branches that could fall and cause injury or damage.
- Bring inside or tie-down garbage cans and lawn furniture.
- Use surge protectors — a safety electrical plug that will shut off the power if lightning strikes to prevent damage to your computer and other household items.

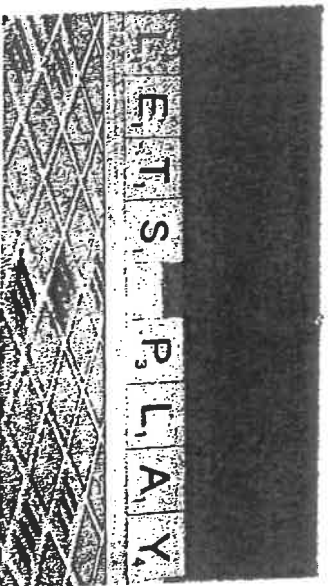

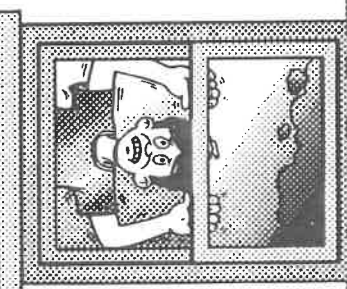

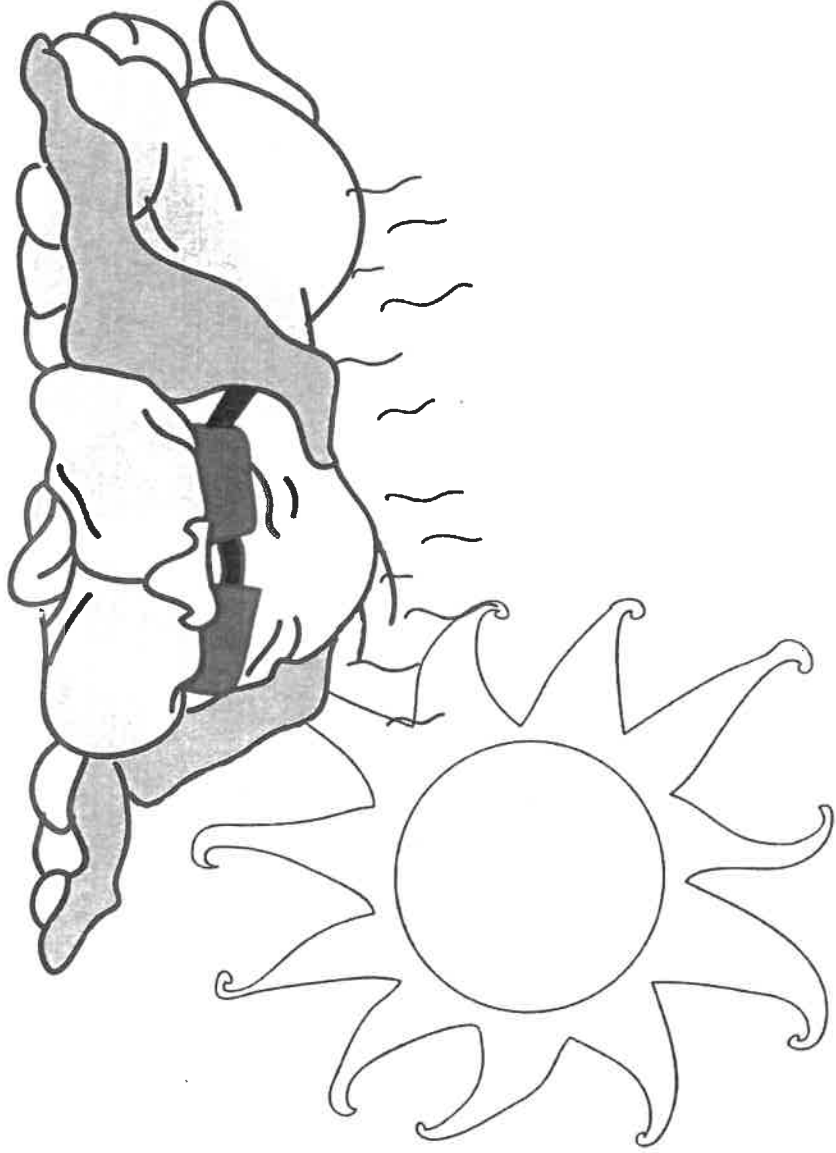
