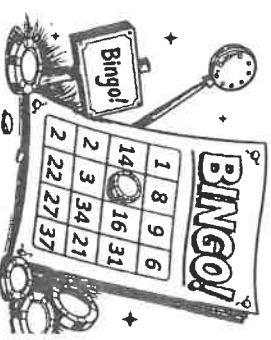
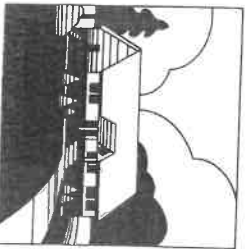

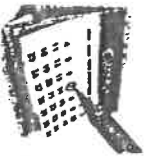

The Trent Lakes Public Library has a lot to offer our patrons. We are routinely complimented on our excellent collection of reading material, so please feel free to visit and browse our shelves. If we don't have the book you are looking for, we will happily try to borrow it from another library through Interlibrary Loans.

We are also part of a Large Print Pool, through which we receive approximately 50 large-print books every four months. This gives our patrons an opportunity to enjoy a greater variety of reading material. Effective January 1, 2026, Ontario is introducing strict driving rules to improve road safety, including a lifetime license suspension for impaired driving causing death, extended roadside suspensions for alcohol/drug-related offenses (7 days for first offense), and mandatory remedial treatment. Other changes involve stricter penalties for distracted driving and increased oversight for senior drivers. 📺 Ontario Newsroom +4

Key Impaired Driving Changes (Effective Jan 1, 2026):

- **Lifetime Suspension:** A lifetime driver's license suspension applies upon conviction of impaired driving causing death, with potential re-application after 25 years under strict conditions.
- **Increased Roadside Suspensions:** First-time administrative alcohol/drug-related suspensions increase from 3 to 7 days, and second-time suspensions increase from 7 to 14 days.
- **Mandatory Education:** A first administrative suspension requires completion of a remedial education program, while subsequent suspensions require treatment programs.
- **Young/Novice Drivers:** Longer license suspensions for zero-tolerance violations. 📺 Ontario Newsroom +3

Other 2026 Driving Rule Updates:

- **Distracted Driving:** Stricter regulations regarding handheld devices, with reports indicating fines up to \$2,000, 3–5 demerit points, and 3-day suspensions for first-time offenders.
- **Senior Driver Re-evaluations:** More frequent vision tests and mandatory medical fitness declarations for drivers aged 70+.
- **Medical Reporting:** Increased legal obligations for doctors and optometrists to report medical conditions (e.g., vision loss, cognitive decline) that affect driving safety.
- **Auto Theft and Stunt Driving:** Increased penalties and stricter punishments for auto theft, vehicle fraud, and reckless driving. 📺 Instagram +4

These changes aim to drastically increase accountability for safety violations, with many penalties escalating more rapidly for repeat offenders. 📺 YouTube +1

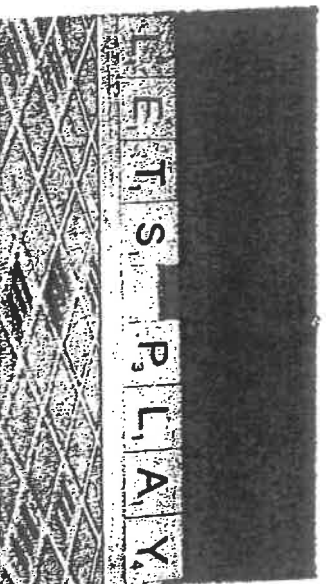

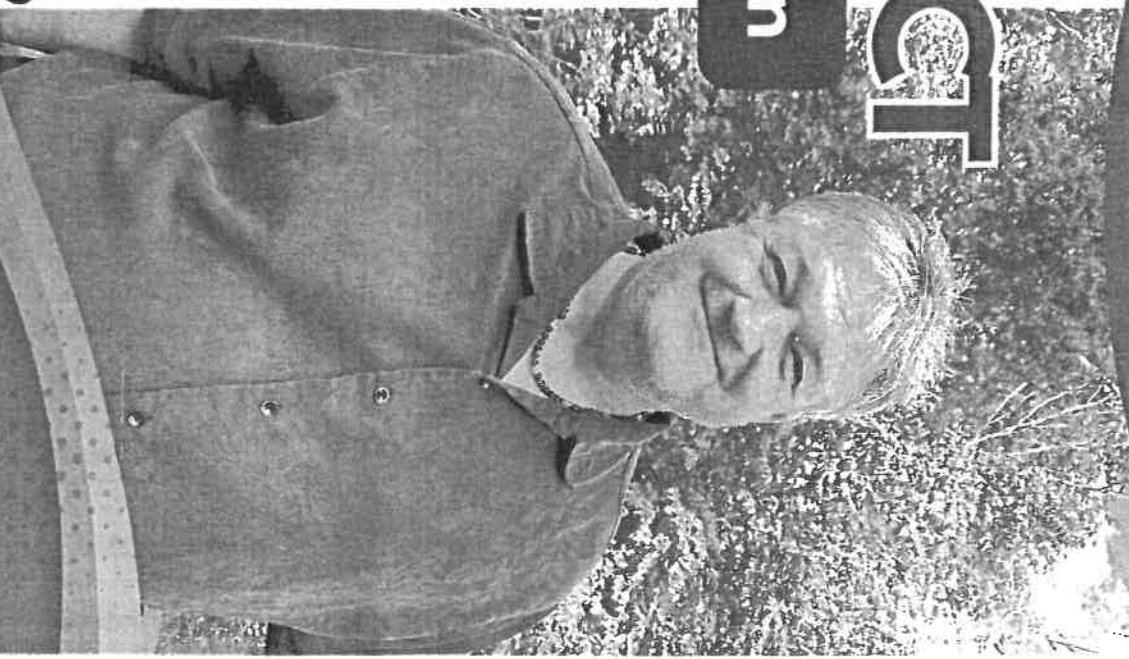

It happened this Month....

September 20th, 1503 – first recorded use of the name “Newfoundland”

September 13th, 1759 – General James Wolfe led his soldiers up an ungarrisoned footpath and set for battle before the fortress walls. Montcalm attacked in the morning but his line broke, and Quebec fell into British hands. Both generals perished.

September 15th, 1773 – arrival of ship Hector in Nova Scotia bringing Scottish settlers.

September 11th, 1854 – Austin Morin and Sir Allen MacNab formed a political coalition and provided the foundation for the future Conservative Party

September 1st, 1864 – Charlottetown Conference was held in PEI and the Maritime union was virtually dropped and delegates agreed to meet in Quebec to discuss a Canadian Scheme for a union of all colonies.

September 20th, 1867 – First election post-confederation. Sir John A. Macdonald leads the Conservative Party to victory.

September 15th, 1874 – Treaty 4 was signed at Fort Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan, with Cree, Chippewa and other First Nations.

September 20th, 1875 – Treaty 5 was concluded at Lake Winnipeg ceding an area of approximately 100,000 square miles inhabited by Chippewa and Swampy Cree of Manitoba and Ontario.

September 22nd, 1877 – Treaty 7 was signed at Blackfoot Crossing in southern Alberta by the Siksika, Kainai, Piikani, Tsuut'ina and Stoney. Canadian officials understood that by the Treaty First Nations surrendered some 35,000 square miles of land to the Crown in return for reserves, payments and annuities..

September 30th – Marks the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation.

Think about the threat of invasive species when planning your next hike. Learn what you can do to make sure your love of nature doesn't accidentally harm the trails you visit.

1. STAY ON THE PATH

Stay on the paths designated for hiking in natural areas to avoid picking up invasive seeds on your shoes and spreading them.

2. CLEAN YOUR GEAR

Check all of your hiking gear at the end of your outing for plants and mud that might be carrying invasive plant seeds or fragments.

3. GROOM YOUR PET

Make sure your pets don't bring back an invader from the forest. Look over them at the end of the trail and wash or brush off any mud, seeds or plant parts. Stop invasive plants from hitching a ride and spreading to new areas..

4. REPORT ALL INVADERS

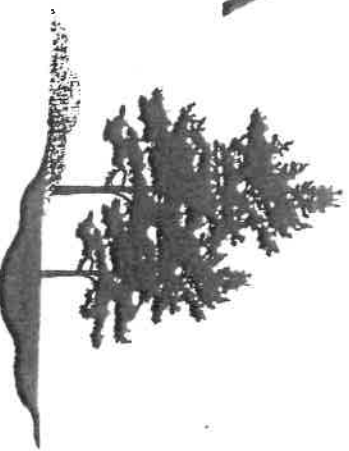

Drought

Drought is slow to occur and caused by a combination of factors such as lack of rain, high temperatures and increased demand for water.

Hazard information

Factors that affect drought conditions include:

- lack of rain
- warmer temperatures
- increased evaporation
- increased human water use

Droughts can lead to:

- lower water levels in lakes, streams and rivers
- reduced soil moisture and groundwater levels
- declines in drinking water supply
- loss of commercial, industrial and agricultural production
- declines in water quality and reduced hydroelectric production
- declines in tourism, recreation and shipping
- loss of fish and wildlife habitat

Stages of low water conditions

The Ministry of Natural Resources and conservation authorities monitor precipitation, stream flow and water levels regularly to gauge water conditions.

Based on what they learn, they assign one of three warning levels to the situation:

- Level 1 – the potential for water supply problems is identified
- Level 2 – minor water supply issues are encountered
- Level 3 – supply may no longer meet demand; social and economic impacts are anticipated

Local government response to drought and low water levels can range from water conservation messaging to water use restrictions.

Safety tips

If you are experiencing a drought, follow your local municipality's instructions for obtaining water.

If you are a homeowner or renter:

- repair all leaks in taps and toilets
- install low consumption toilets, dishwashers, shower heads, etc.
- follow municipal water use restrictions (for example: lawn watering, car washing)
- choose drought-resistant trees and plants
- wash only full loads of laundry or dishes

If you are a farmer:

- check your irrigation systems regularly for leaks
- irrigate in the evening or later in the day when temperatures are lower and there is less evaporation loss
- avoid irrigating during windy conditions
- use rain gauges to measure how much water your crops are getting
- ensure the irrigation system doesn't water faster than the ground can absorb it

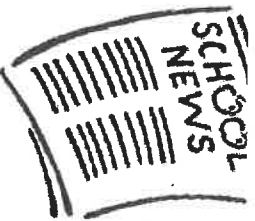
If you work in the agricultural or manufacturing industries:

- set up a water conservation program
- survey plant operations
- determine ways to increase efficiency

Prepare now

Take the following steps so you and your family are prepared in the event of a drought:

- Install rain barrels to collect rain water from the roof which can be used to water gardens and flush toilets during a time of water shortage.
- Stock pile water required for human and pet consumption or hygiene during periods of normal water availability by filling containers from a safe water source or purchasing.
- Be aware of seasonal influences on water levels, e.g. ground water levels are usually highest during spring as a result of precipitation and runoff.
- Monitor rain gauges, well water and/or municipal notices regarding community water consumption.

Personal Mobile Devices

All members of the school and community must understand that:

- students in grades 9 to 12 shall store personal mobile devices out of view and powered off or set to silent mode during instructional time, except when their use is explicitly permitted by the educator under the circumstances outlined above,
- it is at the discretion and authority of the principal or designate whether personal electronic device usage compromises or interferes with school security, personal safety, individual privacy or academic integrity. As such, Principals may consider a range of responses, using a bias-aware progressive discipline approach, to address such behaviour,
- the student is responsible for their personal mobile device, how they use it and the consequences of not following the school board's regulations on personal mobile device use.

Please refer to Board Policy ES-1.6, Personal Electronic Devices and Administrative Regulation ES-1.6.1 for further information regarding acceptable and prohibited use of personal mobile/electronic devices for students.

Recipe of the Month

BAKED BUTTERNUT SQUASH

Prep. Time: 5 minutes Cook Time: 40-45 minutes

- 3-4 butternut squash
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon cinnamon
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- ½ cup butter, melted

Wash squash. In a large baking dish, set squash in hot oven and bake at 375° for about 20 minutes. Remove from oven and cut each squash in half. Scoop out seeds and discard. Remove stems if there are any. Combine sugar, brown sugar and cinnamon. Brush each open half of squash with melted butter and then sprinkle on the sugar mixture. Return to oven and bake for another 20-25 minutes or until the inside flesh of the squash is tender. To serve, give each person a half and let each scoop out the inside flesh of the squash. Additional butter and sugar mixture may be added, if desired.

It's a Part of Our History

The following article is from an article written n "Logging of Stoney Creek, Hunt Camps – The Past & Present, Cottage Life

The Ketchecum Hunt Club

This hunt club was originally formed during the 1860's. These men hunted in the area of the Ennismore shoreline of Chemong Lake. As the years passed and this area became more densely populated, the hunters were forced to move further north. Their choice was the woods of Cavendish Township.

Hunting this new area for the first time, the men stayed in a building which had previously been a lumber camp. This camp was located on Ketchecum Lake, below the Bottle Lake Dam. In the late 1800's and early 1900's, Catchacoma Lake was then called Ketchecum Lake. This name was derived from the Chippawa. It meant "Big Lake". The Ketchecum Hunt Club purchased the property from the crown in 1901. Their property has about one mile of shoreline. That same year the club built their club house, complete with a separate dining room and enough area to sleep 22 men.

Over the years, the camp had lost at least two men to the depths of Catchacoma Lake. Their names were Theodore and Clarence Simpson. They were father and son and both were guides for the hunt club. Their drowning occurred over a twenty year span. Neither one of their bodies were ever recovered from the cold deep waters of Catchacoma.

Their camp has stayed in existence right up to the present. However, in 2001, the members decided to sell their property on Catchacoma and have since relocated five miles east of Apsley, just off Hwy. # 503.

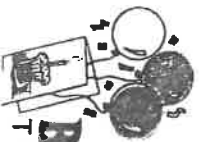

A Tale of 3 Dogs Part 3: Riley's Story

Who knew that this spring and summer you would be reading 3 stories in quick succession about pesticides killing companion animals and blameless wildlife? But here we are: first Torch, then Coco and finally Riley. Well, "finally" in terms of our stories this summer but, no doubt, not in terms of beloved dogs and harmless wildlife suffering and dying horrible, often prolonged deaths.

Riley's Story

Riley was a treasured rescue dog belonging to Maurice Brenner and his family in Pickering. Like Torch and Coco, he was the apple of his human family's eye.

According to Maurice, it happened like this. "Our previous Beagle had passed away and we were determined that if we were to get another, it would be a rescue; a dog that needed a forever-after home until senior-hood. When we found Riley in 2015, he was still a puppy, born for the sole purpose of research. He had been transported from the United States to Ontario where we picked him up.

"Riley was shy and afraid of his own shadow, but over time, through love and affection we gained his trust. Little did we know that our Riley would be gone so soon.

"In February 2021, we had had an apparently normal walk one evening, but he seemed "off" the next morning – he was whimpering and refusing to eat, and his hind legs were clearly weak. We contacted our vet right away and, after checking him over, the vet suspected a tooth infection and scheduled him for oral surgery as soon as possible. I dropped him off at the vet's office the next day, believing I would be picking him up after lunch. Then came the call no one ever wants to hear. 'We ran into a complication and Riley passed on the table.'

"Wanting to understand why, I quizzed the vet until we learned that Riley had been poisoned and nothing could have saved him. I needed to do more research to grasp how my dog was exposed to poison. Then I remembered that he had ingested something on his last walk with me. He had picked up a dead mouse, which I had pulled out of his mouth, but from that moment his fate was sealed. He would die from rodenticide poisoning, leaving our family heartbroken."

Then What Happened?

This all sounds familiar. A normal, happy, healthy dog living the dream. Then, suddenly, illness, misery, death! The family is shocked and wants to understand how this could happen, how he could die while simply getting his teeth cleaned. Like Torch's Allison and Coco's Janice, Riley's Maurice decided to take action to help other companion animals avoid such a fate.

Maurice is a councillor for a Pickering ward in Durham. He had been at a special council meeting about the budget while Riley was having his teeth cleaned. When Maurice took the phone call from the vet, his colleagues were shocked to see him turn white, break down, and have to leave the meeting. When he returned a little later and explained, they too were shocked.

At that time no one was sure exactly why Riley had died, but Maurice pursued the question. Eventually the vet concluded that he had been poisoned by rodenticides – remember that dead mouse Riley had picked up? Not satisfied with simply accepting this information, Maurice reported back to his colleagues on council.

His fellow council members were all pet lovers, they had known Riley and they saw the devastation to Maurice's family and understood the potential for more widespread harm. As a result, they banned the use of rodenticides on municipal property. They also launched a public awareness campaign throughout the municipality describing the unintentional harm caused by the chemicals, and recommending other means of controlling unwanted pests.

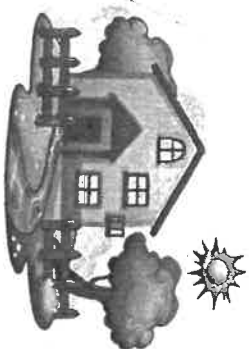
Once again may I remind you of our municipal election next month and urge you to ensure you are on the Voters' List and then to vote for council members who will support activities and changes you favour. I know of 2 candidates who have already shown interest in preventing unintentional deaths such as those experienced by Torch, Coco and Riley.

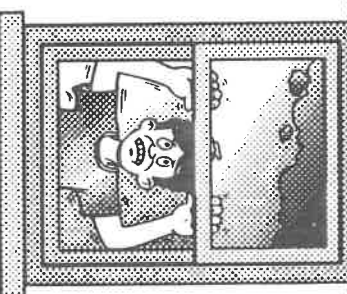

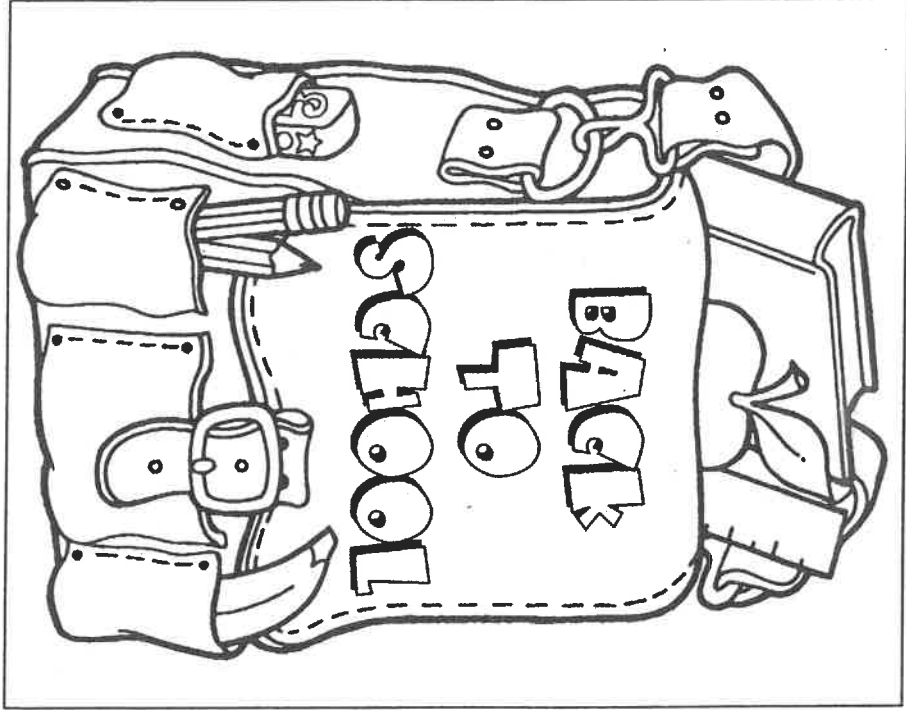
